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The Phillips Collection Presents *Avery, Gottlieb & Rothko: By the Sea*

Tracing the creative exchange and coastal summers that helped define three influential figures in 20th-century American art.



WASHINGTON, DC—The Phillips Collection presents [*Avery, Gottlieb & Rothko: By the Sea*](#), the first exhibition to examine in depth how the friendship, artistic exchange, and shared summers on Cape Ann in Gloucester, Massachusetts, shaped three of the most influential American artists of the 20th century: Milton Avery (1885–1965), Adolph Gottlieb (1903–1974), and Mark Rothko (1903–1970). On view from **October 24, 2026, through January 24, 2027**, the exhibition brings together approximately 90 paintings, watercolors, drawings, and sketches that reveal the personal and artistic connections that developed among the artists over four decades.

The artists, who met in New York City, were drawn to Gloucester by Avery, who first visited Cape Ann in the 1920s. As the oldest of the three, Avery introduced Gottlieb and Rothko to the region in the 1930s and mentored them. The summers they spent together painting, drawing, and exchanging ideas became a foundation for experimentation and discovery throughout their careers. The idea of Cape Ann as a place of artistic freedom is reflected in recollections from Sally Michel Avery, artist and Avery's wife, who described Gloucester as a place to “live like an artist,” capturing the creative spirit that drew the group to the rocky coast and sandy beaches. They found a creative community there and an escape from the pressures of New York.

Avery, Gottlieb & Rothko: By the Sea traces this important moment of development in American art, connecting Avery, an American modernist known for representational art, with Gottlieb and Rothko,

who would later become internationally recognized for abstract art and the New York School of the 1950s. The exhibition illuminates how a shared sense of place, an expressive use of color, and experimentation with scale became catalysts for each artist's individual development. These explorations, from representational imagery to increasingly abstract forms, are seen in Avery's harbor sketches and luminous coastal scenes, Rothko's figurative compositions and color-drenched canvases, and Gottlieb's beach box motifs, the source of his celebrated *Pictographs*.

"The Phillips has long been home to these three artists. Their work is not only central to the history of modern art but is also woven into the DNA of this museum," said **Jonathan P. Binstock, Vradenburg Director and CEO of The Phillips Collection**. "This exhibition reveals something we haven't fully seen before: how a shared sense of place and deep friendship gave rise to some of the most important art of the 20th century, and, perhaps surprisingly, an undercurrent of aesthetic affinities that continued to resonate throughout their mature, iconic work."

The Phillips Collection was the first museum in the United States to acquire work by Avery, to establish a permanent gallery for Rothko's paintings in 1960, and to hold significant paintings by Gottlieb in its collection. The exhibition builds on recent technical research conducted at The Phillips Collection, where conservators studied works by the artists using advanced imaging and analytical techniques, yielding new insights into their materials, working methods, and creative processes.

"Exploring the friendship and shared experiences of Avery, Gottlieb, and Rothko during their summers on Cape Ann offers a fresh perspective on their artistic development. This story will be new to many of our guests, and several of the works have never been on public view. Bringing together the artists in this context has allowed us to look closely at the exchanges that shaped their work as they responded to influences and new directions in American modernism," said **Renée Maurer, Associate Curator at The Phillips Collection and coordinating curator of the exhibition**.

Numerous works will be loaned from the artists' family collections as well as from major museums and institutions across the country. The 16 lending museums include the National Gallery of Art—which is contributing ten works by Mark Rothko—the Smithsonian American Art Museum, the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, the Whitney Museum of American Art, The Museum of Modern Art, the Brooklyn Museum, the Carnegie Museum of Art, the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art, the Rhode Island School of Design Museum (The Albert Pilavin Memorial Collection of 20th-Century American Art), the Ackland Art Museum at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the Herbert F. Johnson Museum at Cornell University, the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, the Frances Lehman Loeb Art Center at Vassar College, the Cape Ann Museum, and The Phillips Collection.
